FREDERICK LAW OLMSTED: DESIGNING AMERICA

Frederick Law Olmsted is considered the greatest landscape architect who ever lived. Noted for his work on Central Park, the Emerald Necklace in Boston, and the "White City" of the 1893 World's Columbian Exposition in Chicago. Olmsted created and co-designed countless public and private landscapes throughout North America. His sons carried on his legacy, working on state and county party systems, and our National Parks.

This PBS film focuses on Olmsted's life and career, numerous endeavors and accomplishments in multiple fields.
